Welcome: Meeting called to order by Essence Wilson at 9:06 AM

OLD BUSINESS

Approval of August minutes: Minutes approved with the addition of GCYC's abstention for the MSHDA ESG NOFA vote.

Governance Council Update: Essence stated that David Tweedie gave a presentation on HMIS during the Governance Council meeting. She stated that he provided a very helpful overview on HMIS data. The Governance Council initially planned for HUD to present but they were not available. A vote was presented on adding an additional Governance Council member, Jody Kerbyson, CEO of GST Michigan Works. Essence stated that Jody can provide representation with pathways to employment and training opportunities for the homeless population. The motion was unanimously approved. Essence stated that in the Executive Committee and Governance Council meeting there was a need for an agreement or MOU with hospitals to make sure they are informed about coordinated entry and that they understand the ability to easily access those resources as they discharge patients from hospitals. Essence stated that some individuals will be contacted as a follow-up regarding that. The coordinated entry information was previously sent to hospital offices for the opportunity to make the process more seamless.

REPORTS

H.A.R.A: Vicky Schultz stated that they have added another call roll-over line to address the amount of calls they receive. Vicky stated that she thought the money from the state was coming directly to HARA but because the fiduciary is still Shelter of Flint, the money and contract actually went to Shelter of Flint. She stated Shelter of Flint has signed the contract for the state and are waiting for the money. She stated that HARA was able to get the advanced check about 2 weeks ago for \$417,000 and \$355,000 has already been spent so they must start the billing paperwork.

She stated that the fiduciary information is planned to be changed through MSHDA on October 1st. Vicky stated things are going well with the Legal Services of Eastern Michigan partnership. Vicky stated the court system work also seems to be going well and they rarely come across landlords who do not want to participate in the process. Legal services has been asking the courts to allow at least 14 days for check processing and paperwork. She stated that with the moratorium put back on for federal government through July of 2021 she is not sure what impact that will have on the MSHDA program and they will keep forging forward with helping people with funding until the end of December 2020.

Vicky stated that David Tweedie of OrgCode has been assisting while they work through the HMIS data and getting caught up with data information. She stated that she is unsure if the \$2.4 million will be spent down by the end of December 2020. She stated please continue to get the word about the Eviction Diversion funding and Tammy Chambers and her staff has been going to apartment complexes to seek out families to assist.

Tammy stated that they had over 1,100 Eviction Diversion (EDP) and HARA calls as of last month and now lines have been separated so no calls would be neglected. They are open on Saturdays and they take open calls from 9 am to 2 pm. Tammy stated she is still speaking to the landlord association every other week. The HARA has been busy but thriving. Jill Nylander gave kudos to HARA as their project continues to come together quite well. Jim Perlaki stated that as Continuous Quality Improvement chair leading the EDP project, Catholic Charities and HARA are doing tremendous work in meeting the needs of the community. He stated that Genesee County has been noticed as heroes in the EDP project for meeting our communities' needs quickly. The number for the EDP is (810) 600-4525.

Tammy stated that the ones who will truly benefit from the EDP program are those that are under the 50% AMI. MSHDA has changed the rules to where they can pay up to \$12,000 in future rent (usually breaks down to 2 months). The only recipients who can be seen as ineligible for the program is those with a very high income of \$80,000 or above. Low-income recipients would benefit tremendously regardless of their residing subsidy. Jim stated it has to be someone who is facing an eviction due to rent issues as this is not a foreclosure or homeownership program. Vicky stated that Tammy has also been working with Antoinette on trying to get in contact with 50 referrals of individuals with low scores on the QBNL list. Essence stated that as we think about how the QBNL may be available in HMIS, this could be an opportunity to do outreach to other HMIS partners in locating these clients.

Street Outreach: Jim stated that the adult engagement contacts were 524 for the month of August, not unduplicated. He stated that the street outreach team was able to complete 8 homeless verifications and of those contacts they made 108 to other agencies, the HARA or internally through the Coordinated Entry process. 456 food bags were passed out as well as ponchos, blankets, shoes and socks. They have also been able to successfully purchase PPE equipment such as masks and hand sanitizers as well as hygiene and other personal products. Jim stated that this past week they began engagement with 2 interns from the University of Michigan school of Social Work so they have been able to increase their team efforts. He stated they are really excited about their involvement on the team and participation in outreach. The team is continuing to engage with HARA and the coordinated entry team daily and they are gearing up to work with Mary Stevenson at the warming center.

Subcommittee/Work Group reports: As of September 4th there are 294 individuals on the QBNL list. The demographics have increased for single families, youth and domestic violence but remained stable in veterans. A total of 4 individuals were housed in August. 2 clients were housed through RRH and 2 were housed through PSH. Antoinette stated that although the number seems small there are a lot of barriers with the housing process currently, so kudos to all the housing agencies that put in their efforts. Last month 79 referrals were sent out to the QBNL. The referrals have decreased due to funding so no referrals have been sent to PSH. 49 individuals have been housed, year to date, through Coordinated Entry and some of the trends are an increase of activity on the QBNL. She stated more individuals are calling into the Metro helpline and individuals are being added to the QBNL daily. Antoinette stated that if you do not complete a CESA or VISPDAT at your agency you can have the individual call the Metro helpline.

NEW BUSINESS

COVID-19 Community Check-in Calls: Calls will resume on Monday, September 21st at 12:00 PM.

OTHER BUSINESS

COC Program NOFA 2020: No updates

Additional discussions: Vicky Schultz stated that they do not have warming center opening date as of yet.

Jim asked about subcommittee QBNL and IST meetings. Antoinette stated that she is in talks with Tracey regarding coordinating meetings and they may have something scheduled by early next month.

Bill Doub stated that he has been talking with David Tweedie regarding what the new VBNL list may look like and they are in the process of moving from hiatus to having serious conversations about how the list can be used and how it can be fed back into the larger QBNL workgroup. Essence stated that David proposed that the QBNL list be available for anyone using HMIS and there needs to be an opportunity where you can consent to seeing this information, so it is used appropriately for both lists.

Debra Hayes stated the Genesee County veteran grant per diem program will kick off on November 1st. The veteran would only need 1 day of active duty to qualify for the program (granted the discharge will be taken into consideration). They have 10 beds available beginning October 1st. Program is 90 days and the staff would have to verify that client can self-resolve or know they qualify for some of the subsidies in the community before they can enter program. There are permanent vouchers available to Genesee County and veterans can potentially transition into that program. Bill Doub stated that once the veteran list is moving again there are vouchers available for permanent supportive housing opportunities.

BECKA Management pulled 75 names from HCV waiting list on September 2nd and work will go out this week.

Bill stated that on Wednesday, September 23rd at 9:00 AM there will be a SOAR Stakeholder meeting. Bill stated CoC members are all invited to send staff. He stated there will be an email sent to the CoC and he can also talk individually about the SOAR process and the SOAR training cohorts through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

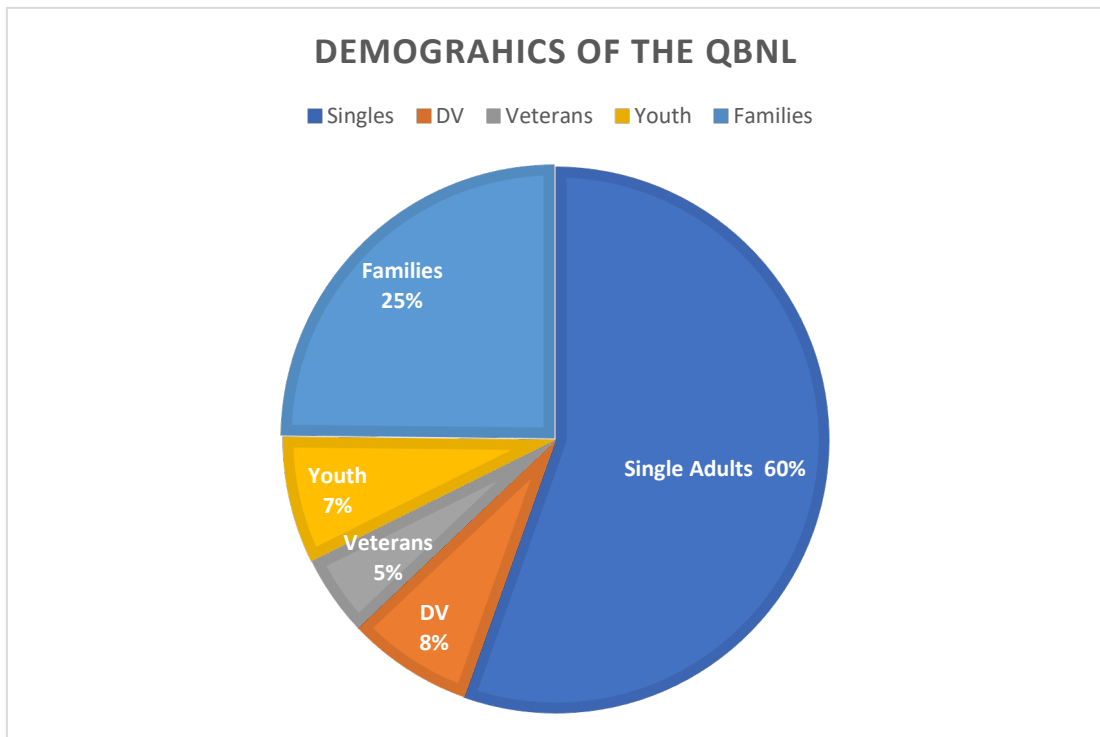

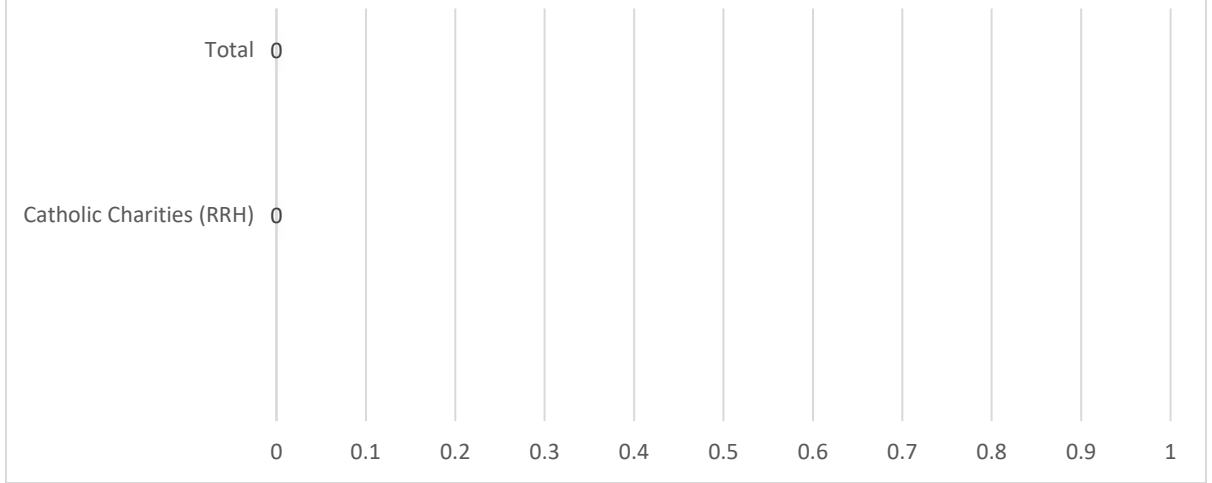

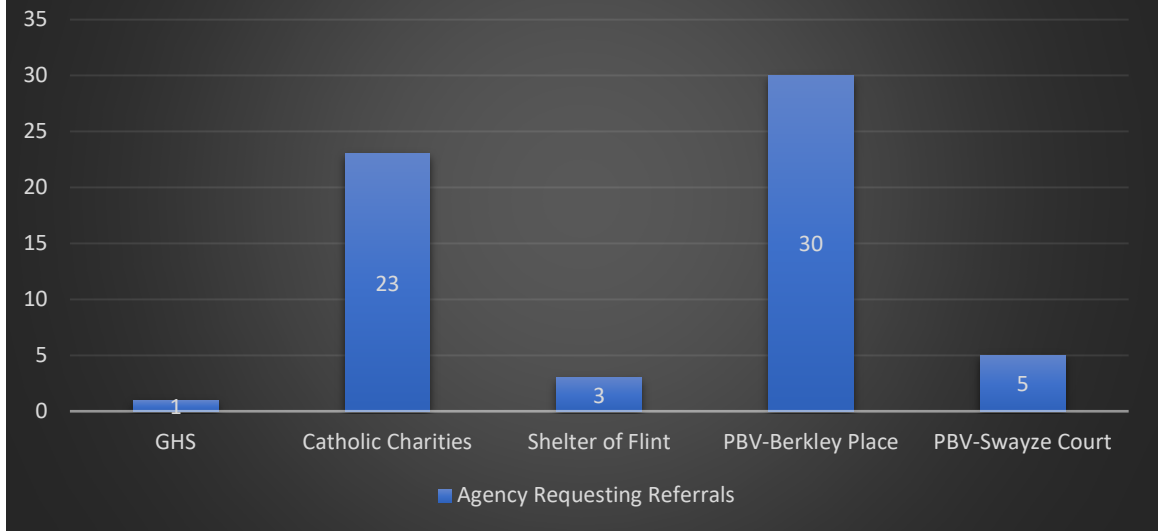

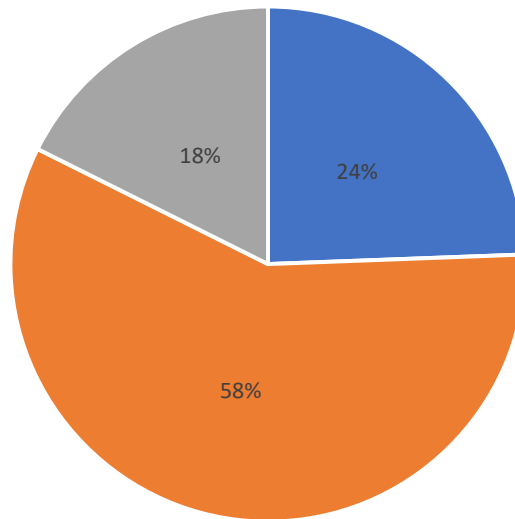
Housed September 2020

B. **Qualitative:** The QBNL helped Genesee County House the most vulnerable clients first.

C. **Observations, Comparisons/Trends:** For the month of September the QBNL has been steady with only slight movement. There was a small increase of clients who entered the Coordinated Entry System due to evictions. (Clients couldn't be assisted through Eviction diversion program). Housing referrals were temporarily paused towards the end of the month due to lack of funding. Available PBV Apartments have provided alternative housing options for clients who scored into PSH.

Note: No Follow-up Business Meetings or Conference Calls have been scheduled pending review by CoC Governance Council of the purpose and function of the workgroup and re-establishment of the Inter-Agency Systems Team. Included in the review will be a re-statement of the Continuum's commitment to the Built for Zero initiative.

5. Goal (short/long term):
 - a. **Short term:** Establishment and implementation of a Quality By-Name List for the purpose of moving individual veterans from homelessness to long-term stable housing.
 - b. **Long term:** Creation of affordable housing opportunities for veterans to move from homelessness into safe decent housing with the supports they need to sustain their individual housing choices.
6. Outcomes:
 - a. **Quantitative:** Increase in the numbers of veterans moved from the shelter and 'literal' homelessness to housing as identified on the By-Name List and HMIS.
 - b. **Qualitative:** Establishment of a working By-Name List that meets monthly using HMIS generate data reports.
7. Observations, Comparisons/Trends: **"We have all the pieces to the puzzle. We need to put them together." Further, we need to measure what we are doing against the Benchmarks for Achieving Functional Zero in conjunction with the Continuum's work to develop a functioning Quality By-Name List. The following is a summary of our meeting with the Continuum's HMIS resource consultant: Our discussion turned out to be a follow-up from the comments made at our last CoC meeting regarding the Inter-Agency Systems Team and where we would be going from here. Comments and feedback was requested from those who participated in the discussion.**
 - a. The goal is to develop one By-Name List using HMIS data tracking and HMIS reporting. The other lists of clients and prioritization flow from the one list.
 - b. HMIS participating agencies would download reports from HMIS based on clients entered into HMIS by agencies including their SPDAT scores.
 - c. Spreadsheets with clients names being sent out via e-mail presented several privacy issues thus requiring us to develop a different format using HMIS as the focal point.
 - d. The Quality By-Name List would be maintained by Metro Community Development with technical assistance provided by OrgCode.

- e. **Leadership for a newly re-constituted IST would come from the participating HMIS agencies and/or Metro Community Development. Conference calls would be minimized as participants would already have access to the list via HMIS.**
- f. **In their feedback, the VA made it clear that maintaining and using the By-Name List was critically important. Veterans referred to the recently opened *per diem* program would be referred from the BNL.**
- g. **From our standpoint the Q-BNL flows from Coordinated Entry as it processes clients identified through outreach etc. As such our work affirms the integrity of the Coordinated Entry System and how the By-Name List is to be used to address clients with critical needs.**

5. **Goal (short/long term):** Short term – continue to review the implementation of the eviction diversion program and offer insight and suggestions to strengthen the approach from lessons learned.
6. **Outcomes:**
 - a. **Quantitative:** Have met since April 2019 to complete the process of beginning an eviction diversion with the county landlords, courts, CoC membership organizations and those at risk.
 - b. **Qualitative:** We are reviewing the progress and analyzing changes that may need to take place to strengthen the delivery of services.

Observations, comparisons/Trends: The committee started with an update from the HARA, Legal Services of Southeast Michigan and the 67th District Court. HARA UPDATES – They have nearly spent \$1 million to date with a continuing walk in populations every Saturday of more than 50 people. They are out of prevention dollars and are looking to partner with other agencies with prevention dollars for utility assistance. The City of Flint has offered to provide support in this effort. The tenants are getting pressure from landlords since the CDC decision to move forward to get the rent paid. LEGAL SERVICES UPDATES – The amount of cases has begun slowing down although it remains high. More cases are being adjourned and moving forward with the CDC declaration. The opportunity for EDP support with leases that are month to month are acceptable under the CDC process as long as the case is for non-payment of rent and not termination of tenancy. Kyle reported that there have been a couple of names that have reappeared on the docket of one of the judges who had been served previously. DISTRICT COURT UPDATES - The courts largest concern is the communication to the tenant to be sure to file a proof of services that they provided the deceleration to the landlord. This will protect them when the landlord states they never got word. The numbers of filings has slowed down and the numbers of adjournments have increased. This is good. GENERAL OBSERVATIONS – The concerns with Piper Legal has subsided. They appear to be working better than before although their patience level is still not high in waiting for payment for their clients. The State of Michigan budget office is concerned about the level of spending across the state. They are discussing options to recapture unspent money to be reallocated to other needs if it will not get spent out. Greg will keep an eye on this. MSHDA has committed to provide man power support for communities to get started who have had a slow start in order to

Notes

What is SOAR?

- SSI/SSDI, Outreach, Accessibility and Recovery. A model for assisting eligible individuals to apply for Supplement Security income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) between ages of 18-62 years there has to be a medical decision on if person is able or to work.

Bottom Line:

- We need to increase the number of SOAR trained staff in Genesee County and the City of Flint

SOAR Claims and Outcomes in Genesee County and State of MI

- 8 trained SOAR Practitioners through MDHHS in Genesee County (3 logged outcomes through Genesee Health System and Odyssey House) all data has not been tracked yet*
- 15 SOAR claims (\$11,618 monthly income coming in)
- =\$139,416 Yearly Impact!

- 156 SOAR claims processed in state of MI
 - 116 approvals=74% approval rate
 - 92% approval rate in Genesee County
 - 93 days average for SOAR decision (compared to about 1 year for an individual without assistance)
 - \$88,290 per month coming into state of MI as a result of work through SOAR
- An average of 93 days for MI

Why is this important?

- SOAR helps us expedite our clients' access to healthcare and other benefits through coordination, communication and collaboration.
- For people experiencing homelessness there is only a 10-15% approval rate, with the SOAR model they have a much higher chance of being approved for benefits.
- HUD, MSHDA (and City of Flint) want to see how we are helping clients apply for benefits. They require that Supportive Housing Program (SHP) participants assist clients in applying for benefits (as well as any housing assisted program through the State/federal government).
- We need to figure out what is keeping the client from working full time (i.e. does the client have occurring substance abuse disorder or serious mental illness, etc.) and how does this affect their day to day functions. As a result, we can work with client toward getting them approved and connected to other services.
- It brings resources and funds back into the Flint/Genesee County community (through Medicaid etc.)

Four Areas of Functional Information (Client Eligibility criteria)

- Client has difficulties understanding, remembering and applying information
- Client has difficulties interacting with supervisors, coworkers and the public
- Client has increased difficulties with maintaining concentration as it relates to work productivity
- Client has difficulties in adapting or managing oneself, regulating emotions or controlling behavior or wellbeing in work setting
 - Also a client with significant issues physically

SSI/SSDI and SOAR Information and tools:

- The medical summary report that is written is vital especially for more transient and chronic homeless clients, that model is essential for documenting their information, clinical and nonclinical, to MDHHS.
- 20 CEUs are reflected into training hours and generally it takes 30-40 hours to complete the SOAR training and cohort training is over the course of 60 days

Action Items:

- CoC needs to discuss incorporating SOAR process into the Coordinated Entry process and HMIS data
- CoC needs to look into hiring a SOAR specialist who can be referred through the Continuum
- Tracey will look into the CoC Planning grant (or Outreach grant) to see if there is a possibility to redirect dollars for funding and sustaining SOAR work (and incentivize \$\$ for SOAR training time)
- At some point SOAR trained staff may need to be trained by SAMSHA for working with youth as well
- Alisha will send a MDHHS list of SOAR certified practitioners across the state
- Jamie stated they would be open at United Way to providing a small grant to help encourage organizations to get the training possibly \$1000 to \$2,000 to help offset costs so they can develop the capacity.
